Senior Warden's Notes

Bishop Hunn will be visiting St. Andrews on September 12. During his visit he will be confirming our candidates for confirmation. There are several details of the sequence of his visit that have yet to be determined, but the Vestry will make all attempts to keep the parish informed and up-to-date of any major changes that may occur between now and then.



Canon to the Ordinary Lee Curtis will be here at St. Andrews on September 19. The purpose of his visit is to review the process of Transition with the congregation so everyone is informed as to how Transition will proceed.

This is an extremely important presentation that the Vestry encourages all parishioners to attend, in person or online. We are still working out some details on how to give this presentation the widest possible distribution and we will keep you informed as we proceed.

Senior Warden's Comments

As has been announced earlier, the Vestry is planning on holding the Parish Annual Meeting in January, 2022. at which the Parish will have to elect three new Vestry members to replace those members whose terms expire at the end of 2021, as well as confirming the three Vestry members who were appointed to fill the three vacancies that occurred at the end of 2020.

This will be a critical Vestry election for us as this new Vestry will be the one guiding us as we journey through Transition and Search.

Historically, the Vestry has identified church members who are amenable to serving on Vestry, consulted with them, and then put them forward at the Annual Meeting for election. This has worked well in the past but we are dealing with unique circumstances with this upcoming election. The actions and decisions that this new Vestry will be required to make and take will affect St. Andrews and its survival for the foreseeable future, not only in whom we choose to call as our new Rector, but also in how we are perceived in the Roswell community as a warm, loving, and welcoming church.

In order for us to do this, we, as a Vestry and congregation, must provide the leadership necessary to affect the changes to bringing these perceptions about. That's not to mean rock and roll services, drive-in size view screens, flashing lights, and movie theater-like church interiors. It means we need to take good, long, and hard looks at our attitudes and the way we do things in order to make us a more attractive alternative to non-denominational mega-churches.

Look deep inside yourselves. Do you want St. Andrews to evolve to become a vibrant, warm, loving, and accepting church which can attract a dynamic and energetic Rector to spiritually lead us? Do you have fresh ideas for doing things? Are you willing to step outside the old ways of thinking and try new things or ideas? If so, think long and hard about willingly volunteering to serve on a Vestry that provides the leadership for us to grow and prosper.

Talk to any member of the current Vestry and ask questions if you have reservations. Remember, if we are not moving forward, we are being left behind.

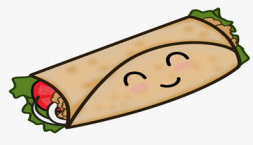

The Ministry of the Verger

(Part 1 of a series on Lay Ministries)

The Office of Verger dates back to the Middle Ages when the Verger was the "Protector of the Procession." He led the procession into the church or cathedral, clearing the way for the procession and protecting it from vagabonds and animals that tried to attack it. Today, in many parishes and cathedrals you will see a verger ceremonially leading the procession. The verger wears a gown and carries a virge (Staff of Office) to help clear the way, and point the way for the procession

Now, the ministry of the verger is seen as one of service and welcome and is thriving in the twenty-first century! Today's vergers are laypersons who **serve the church in this ministry of service and welcome**. Often the visitor will see the verger in a simple cassock moving about the church preparing for worship. The verger is able to respond to any inquiry concerning the upcoming service, church facilities or current program offerings.

The verger's logistical and behind the scenes support allow the clergy more time for pastoral and sacramental responsibilities. We often say that every parish has a verger whether or not they are identified as such. Some typical verger duties are assigning, training and checking in lectors, chalice bearers, acolytes and prayer intercessors. The verger often coordinates with the altar guild and funeral guild. In some parishes the verger checks lighting and sound.

The precise duties of the verger will be specific to each parish church. For instance, in some parishes the verger will process at all liturgies and in others, they only process on Feast or Festival days. Especially helpful with **visiting clergy or special services**, the verger checks on additional seating, hospitality and welcoming newcomers. Most parishes, either small or large, and clergy who incorporate the verger position, wonder how they ever did without vergers!

St. Andrew's is blessed to have a very diligent Verger in Sissy Mayne. Although in our current, scaled down services, she isn't assisting with processions, she continues to care for the church and its furnishings and fixtures. See page 5 for information about her program of keeping the church woodwork oiled and healthy. (You can help!)

In the Diocese...

Camp Stoney

Last month, lack of space kept us from sharing Kathleen Pittman's marvelous report on her week at Camp Stoney:

My week was amazing. Great program and great kids. They learned a lot about how to use the BCP.

The overall theme was Coming Home. Each day, the counselors engaged the kids in a Bible story. The kids acted out each story during morning worship and reviewed the stories before Compline.

The music was lively, including "Dropkick me Jesus Through the Goalpost of Life."

I was impressed with the new Missioner for Youth and Young Adults, Br. Angel Rocque. He was extremely organized, and a talented comedian to boot

The counselors were amazing. They led everything that happened, from worship to outside games.

On Thursday evening, Bishop Hunn celebrated Eucharist. He also confirmed one counselor (St Andrew's, Las Cruces) and received another from the Lutheran Church (Cathedral). Of course, the Bishop explained the whole process to the campers.

We did everything possible to protect all of us from Covid. Everyone over 12 years of age was vaccinated. We all wore masks indoors to protect the younger children.

Four Instruments of Communion: 1. Archbishop of Canterbury

The Archbishop of Canterbury is the Focus for Unity for the three other Instruments of Communion of the Anglican Communion, and is therefore a unique focus for Anglican unity. He calls the once-a-decade Lambeth Conference, chairs the meeting of Primates, and is President of the Anglican Consultative Council.

The Most Revd and Rt Hon Justin Welby was enthroned on 21 March 2013. He is the 105th Archbishop of Canterbury. (The first was Augustine in 597.)

The Archbishops of Canterbury are seen by the Anglican Communion of churches as their spiritual leader. He is 'primus inter pares', first among equals, of the other Primates of the various provinces. The Anglican Communion includes all 41 provinces in communion with the See of Canterbury.

He is not an "Anglican Pope. He does not have direct executive authority over any Province but the Church of England, nor over any diocese but the See of Canterbury. Still, as the Archbishop of the first See in England, his pronouncements carry a weight of moral authority.

In this role of leadership of the Communion, he takes the lead in respect of Anglican relationships with other Christian churches in the United Kingdom and abroad, and similarly with non-Christian faiths.

His other roles include:

Primate of All England: The Archbishop has this title in recognition of his lead ecclesiastical role in England. The Church of England has 13,000 parishes. He is regarded as the nation's senior Christian and spiritual voice.

Metropolitan for the Southern Province of England: Wielding metropolitan authority (a supervisory authority for defined purposes) over the 30 dioceses in southern England. The Archbishop of York has the same authority in relation to the 14 dioceses in northern England.

Diocesan Bishop of Canterbury: Since 597, the Archbishop's See has been at Canterbury. His diocese in East Kent has a population of 825,000 people and comprises 270 parishes.

Isaac, son of Abraham, father of Jacob

In the last article, Isaac, the son of the promise, the “only son”, was spared on Mount Mariah, a place named by Abraham as the “LORD will provide”. In Hebrew, “Jehovah Jireh”. In centuries to come, this location will become the site of the Second Temple in Jerusalem.

After the sacrifice of Isaac, (where he was spared death by the Lord’s intervention), we read nothing else about Isaac until we read about the search for his bride. In between, we read about the death of Sarah. She was 127 years old when she died, meaning Abraham was 137 years old. Sarah was buried in a tomb in an area that later becomes the city of Hebron. Abraham purchased the land from the Hittite owners. That same place is the location of the tombs of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Rebekah (wife of Isaac) and Leah (second wife of Jacob). The cave or tomb of the patriarchs exists today and has been a holy shrine for the people of Israel for nearly four millennia. Access to the cave of the patriarchs today is limited by the Muslim authorities, now in control of the city.

When Abraham was close to death, he commissioned his servant, presumably Eliezer, to find a bride for Isaac. In Hebrew, Eliezer means “G-d is my help”. Abraham sends his servant to find a wife for Isaac from among Abraham’s kinsmen in Mesopotamia, not from among the Canaanites or Hittites who occupy the land he is in. The absence of Isaac from the scriptures until a bride is found, leads some Christian theologians to contend that this parallels Christ. After Christ’s death, resurrection and ascension, He does not appear again until a bride has been prepared for Him. Revelation 19:6-9. The marriage described in Revelation is between the Lamb of G-d and the church. Paul also alludes to the marriage between Christ and the church in Ephesians 5:23-32. Christ himself told his disciples that he was going to his father’s house to prepare a place for them and would return to bring them there. John 14:1-5. In those days, the bridegroom would leave to prepare a home for his bride, on his father’s property. When it

was prepared and the bride was ready, the bridegroom returned to take her there and complete the marriage.

The Holy Spirit is certainly involved in selecting the bride for Isaac. An angel accompanies Eliezer and Eliezer offers a prayer, which is image filled, regarding a spring of water (Gen. 24:12-14). Before the prayer was finished, Rebekah appeared and fulfilled the prayer. Recall the encounter between Jesus at Jacob’s well and the woman of Samaria. Jacob will be Isaac’s son and the water Jesus described, is living water (John 4:5-14).

Rebekah, is the granddaughter of Nahor (Abraham’s brother). She *voluntarily* goes with Eliezer to a land and a people she has never seen. Rebekah meets Isaac and “she became his wife and he loved her.” Genesis 24:67). Abraham, though elderly (at least 137 years old), remarries and has more children. However, Isaac is the son of the promise and the Abrahamic covenant is fulfilled through Isaac and his descendants. Abraham dies at the age of 175 and is buried in the same cave as Sarah. Both Isaac *and* Ismael buried Abraham in the area purchased by Abraham 38 years earlier. (ed. note: significant because Ismael, the half-brother, had been banished, with his mother Hagar, before Isaac was born.)

Just as Sarah was barren, so too was Rebekah. Isaac prayed for Rebekah and the LORD granted his prayer and she became pregnant with twins. The pregnancy was difficult as Rebekah wondered if she was going to die. Rebekah prayed to the LORD and her prayer was answered with this prophetic message from the LORD:

Two nations are in your womb, and two peoples born of you shall be divided;
the one shall be stronger than the other,
the elder shall serve the younger.

When the boys were born, the first born was named Esau, which in Hebrew, means “hairy”. So he was. The second son was named Jacob, which in Hebrew means to follow at the heel or supplant. Jacob did both and he is often referred to as the “heel-grabber”. As names go, not the most endearing for either.

We’ll cover the sale of Esau’s birthright and the life of Jacob in the next article.

9 September

THE MARTYRS OF MEMPHIS:

Sr. CONSTANCE, THECLA, RUTH, FRANCES, CHARLES PARSONS, and LOUIS SCHUYLER



In 1878 the American city of Memphis on the Mississippi River was struck by an epidemic of yellow fever, which so depopulated the area that the city lost its charter and was not reorganized for fourteen years. Almost everyone who could afford to do so left the city and fled to higher ground away from the river. (It was not yet known that the disease was mosquito-borne, but it was observed that high and dry areas were safe.) There were in the city several communities of nuns, Anglican or Roman Catholic, who had the opportunity of leaving, but chose to stay and nurse the sick. Most of them, thirty-eight in all, were themselves killed by the fever. One of the first to die (on 9 September 1878) was Constance, head of the (Anglican) [Community of St Mary](#).

We give you thanks and praise, O God of compassion, for the heroic witness of the Martyrs of Memphis, who, in a time of plague and pestilence, were steadfast in their care for the sick and dying, and loved not their own lives, even unto death; Inspire in us a like love and commitment to those in need, following the example of our Savior Jesus Christ; who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, now and for ever. Amen.



HAITI

In August of 2021, Haiti was hit with a one-two punch. On the 14th, a 7.2 magnitude earthquake, and on the 16th, Tropical Storm Grace brought heavy rains to the same area, causing mudslides and further hampering relief efforts. This was in an area still recovering from Hurricane Matthew in 2016.

Episcopal Relief & Development, the compassionate response of the Episcopal Church to human suffering, is working to provide assistance, both in immediate disaster relief, and fighting the root causes of long-term poverty and suffering.

(They are now collecting funds for use in the aftermath of Hurricane Ida)

In disaster relief, they focus on what is needed on the ground: medical care, food, shelter, safe drinking water and psychosocial services.

In long-term development, they focus on community sources of clean water, improved agriculture, maternal & child health, sanitation and hygiene, malaria control, micro-finance to support emerging businesses, violence against women and children, and disaster risk reduction, equipping local churches to prepare and respond to emergencies.

The ERD always partners with the local Episcopal Diocese and other local agencies in its work.

The Episcopal Church pays for much of the overhead costs of the ERD, so over 90% of your contribution goes directly to the people who need it. Their audited financial statements, 990 Federal Tax Return and Annual Reports are published on their website for all the world to see.

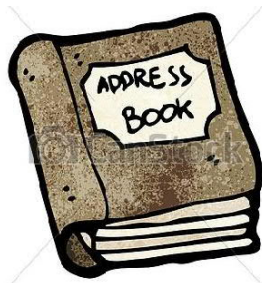

Negative income in Mission & Outreach looks like a bit of an anomaly. It resulted from a prior month adjustment, correcting a deposit.

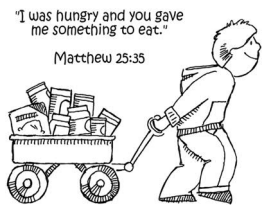

Financial Reports—July 2021
